## **Project 3 Presentation Checklist**

Here are some questions you can ask yourself about your presentation—feel free to reach out to another group to practice your presentation before the presentation day and ask for their feedback. They can give you a better understanding about how your own project will be received.

1.	Time the presentation. How long did it take?
2.	Did the presenters present a clear project statement? Write in your own words what you think the project statement is.
3.	Does the presentation convey that the presenters thought deeply about their project and are knowledgeable about the subject? Why or why not?
4.	How well did the presenters address the intricacies of the assumptions behind their model? Did they address which variables they considered and which they did not?
5.	How well did the presenters explain how their model works? Did they address which states they modeled, and over what time frame? How they modeled their interventions? Which metrics they chose and why? How their update function works?
6.	How well did the presenters explain what their results are?
7.	Did they choose a graphic that was easy to understand and that was helpful in understanding their answer to their problem statement?
8.	How well did the presenters situate their results in the real world? How well does this answer the problem statement(s)?

9.	How well did the presenters critique their model by addressing the quality of the assumptions?
10.	How well did the presenters discuss how good/bad their model is (accurate, precise, fruitful, etc.)
11.	How well did the presenters discuss the limitations of their model?
12.	How well did the presenters discuss possible improvements to their model?
13.	How well did the presentation capture your attention initially, keep your attention throughout, and conclude in a natural (and not abrupt) way? Suggest improvements.
14.	What else do you wish they would have addressed about their model?
15.	Was there the right amount of information on the slides? Was it hard to read the content? Were there full paragraphs that should have been condensed into bullet points?
16.	Did the presenters use their slides as visual aides, and NOT read from it?
17.	Were the slides aesthetically pleasing and provide a coherent visual message? Were there enough images or visuals to keep your attention?
