The one-child policy was a population planning policy of China. The policy was introduced in 1979.





Why was it introduced?

China's population approached one billion in the late 1970s.

The government became concerned about what effect this would have on its economic growth.

How was it enforced?

- 1. Financial incentives
- 2. Fines
- 3. coercive measures, e.g., forced abortions and mass sterilizations.

The policy was more strictly implemented in urban areas.

Controversies

- 1. Violation of human rights.
- 2. female infanticide.
- 3. gender imbalance.

Relaxation and abandonment

- 1. In 2013, couples were allowed to have a second child if one parent is an only child.
- 2. In 2015, the policy was abandoned.

Why being abandoned?

- 1. One of the lowest fertility rate in the world
